

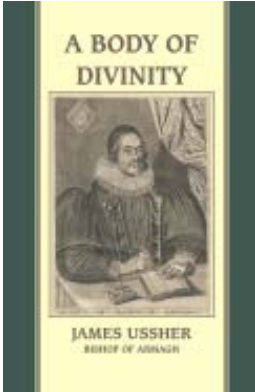

A Body of Divinity

A Body of Divinity or *The Sum and Substance of Christian Religion* catechistically propounded, and explained, by way of question and answer: methodically and familiarly handled. Whereunto is adjoined a tract, entitled *Immanuel* or *The Mystery of the Incarnation of the Son of God*.

The Body of Divinity is James Ussher's most accessible work of theology. It provides a comprehensive summary of the Reformed Christian faith that will prove invaluable to all Christians who want to enter more deeply into the understanding of Scripture.

Ussher was a profound scholar who has much to teach contemporary evangelicals on a number of vital issues. The present volume also includes his *Irish Articles* of 1615 and a brief exposition of the incarnation entitled *Immanuel*. Together they constitute a fine introduction to the thought of one of the

greatest Reformed evangelical scholars of the 17th Century.

Ussher's *Body of Divinity* has not been from Puritan times until 2007. This new edition by the Church Society includes a preface describing Ussher's life and theological contribution by Duncan R. L. Boyd.

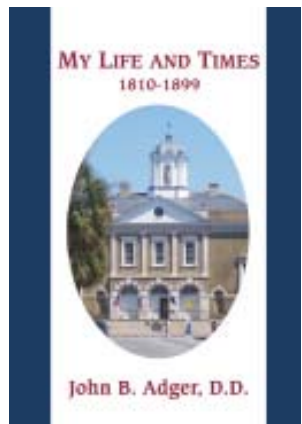
My Life and Times 1810-1899

My Life and Times is a remarkable book for a number of reasons. First, it has never been reprinted for public distribution and sale. This in itself is astonishing due to the very subject matter—the life of John Bailey Adger. Second, Adger was a prominent ecclesiastical figure in the nineteenth century—a friend to James Henley Thornwell, Benjamin Morgan Palmer and John Lafayette Girardeau, a noteworthy student of the original Princetonians (Alexander, Miller, and Hodge), and a missionary of considerable note...

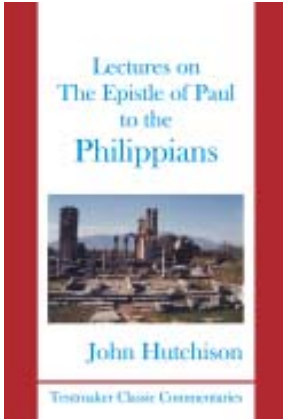

Lectures on Paul's Epistle to the Philippians

"The author depicts Paul in all of his lovely character, which is greatly enhanced by the apostle's humility as seen in chapter 3. As nearly all will agree, however, the most precious section of this epistle appears in the second chapter where the reader is urged to avoid 'esteeming himself as surpassing others, but rather to esteem others above self' (2:3). Then it is that he pens one of the most sublime sections of the Holy Scriptures as he sets forth the Lord Jesus Christ as the ultimate example, 'For think this within you which also was in Christ Jesus, who in the form of God subsisting, not thought it robbery to be equal with God,' etc. (2:5, 6). Hutchinson's exposition of this section is worth the price of the book."—Jay Green.

Rev. Dr. John Hutchison came to Renfrew from Renfield Street Church, Glasgow. He was ordained and inducted to Renfrew United Presbyterian Church on 16th February 1864. His scholarly achievements were widely known, and in 1874 he received the Degree of Doctor of Divinity from Glasgow University. In 1877 he was translated to the newly formed congregation of Bonnington, Leith, where he ministered till his death on 1st March 1901, the last six years of his ministry at Bonnington being as Senior Minister.

Dr Hutchison published in 1884, *Expository Lectures on the First and Second Epistles of Thessalonians*, followed in 1887 by this corresponding volume on Philippians, and later by *Messages to the Seven Churches in Asia*.

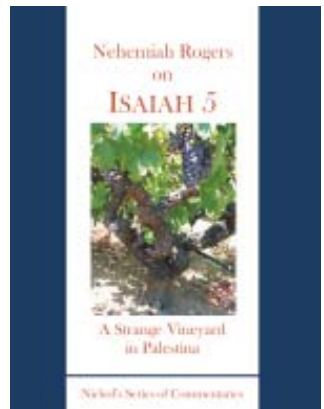

Lectures on Paul's Epistles to the Thessalonians

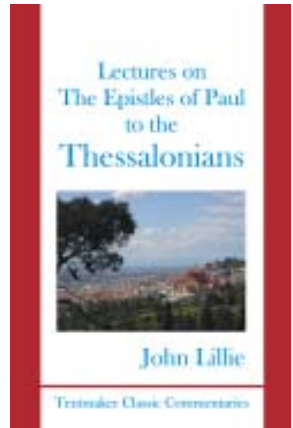
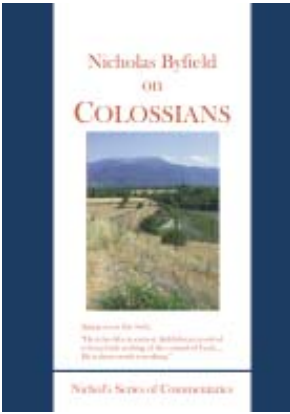

Dr. Lillie is considered by some to have been one of America's first classical and Biblical scholars. He had an unusual regard for the truth and accuracy of the original text; to him every word was significant. If the name of John Lillie is familiar to Bible students, it will probably be through their acquaintance with the American edition of Lange's *Commentary on the Holy Scriptures*, for Lillie translated the portion on the Thessalonian Epistles. His *Lectures of the Epistles of Paul to the Thessalonians* was a distinct work and complemented the former. They have never been reprinted, unlike Lange's *Commentary*, and consequently have commanded very high prices on the secondhand market.

C H Spurgeon in his *Commenting and Commentaries* gave both works top rating and quoted Dr Philip Schaff as saying: "Lillie's Thessalonians will be found to be one of the best executed portions of the American edition of Lange. The translation is remarkably accurate and elegant, and the additions from his own researches, and the best English Commentaries, are carefully selected and valuable." Spurgeon added that these comments applied equally to the *Lectures*.

Lillie also produced *Lectures on the Epistles of Peter* and Schaff wrote in his introduction to them: "...[T]he practice of expository lecturing may be precisely what is needed in our day, to give greater power and efficiency to the pulpit. We urge not so much the consideration that the general adoption of this practice would gather interested hearers around the pulpit, as the consideration that it would minister truly to the spiritual wants of the people of God; and we can scarcely doubt would be followed by a signal revival of the languishing graces and energies of the Church. . . [T]he regular exposition of some book in the Bible, such as we find in these lectures, would insure due attention to important doctrines which otherwise are apt to be overlooked, and the consideration of relative duties which could not otherwise be introduced into the pulpit without the suspicion of some personal or party aim."

Here is stimulating and edifying material for the preacher and the serious Bible student.

The original was published in the 1673 and has a foreword by John Owen. Samuel Petto (c 1624-1711) was a dissenting minister in Sudbury, Suffolk. The list of 29 Scottish ministers recommending the book include M'Crie of Edinburgh and Kidd of Aberdeen. This edition has been completely retypeset from the 1820 reprint and includes a new 24pp introduction to Samuel Petto and his works by Mark Jones.

Hugh M Ferrier

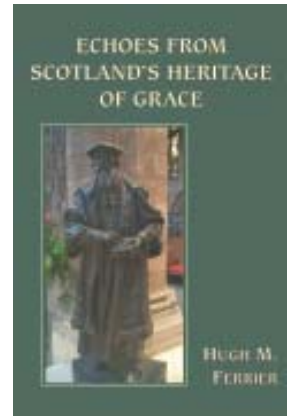

"I have written these pages to try to express some of the glories of God's grace experienced by Scottish people in the past. I have also particularized with regard to the Free Church of Scotland, to note how easily and quickly a church can be diverted from her high and holy calling as happened in the 19th century. The Free Church was born in revival, yet within a generation or so, the seeds of doubt and unbelief were sown in that Church which had been evangelical to the core, and those seeds have produced a bitter harvest from which the Church in Scotland has never recovered." — from the Preface.

Hugh Ferrier was born in Greenock in 1925. He grew up under the ministry of the Rev. G.N.M. Collins who later became Professor of Church History at the Free Church College, Edinburgh. Perhaps Mr. Ferrier's love for Church History can be traced to these early days under Dr. Collins. Hugh Ferrier professed faith in 1943. During the war years Mr. Ferrier served as a Wireless Telegraphist in the Royal Navy.

In 1946 he began studies for the Christian ministry, graduating with an MA from Edinburgh University and completing the divinity course at the Free Church College. He was ordained and inducted to Golspie Free Church in 1952, moved to Knockbain in 1960, to Partick, Glasgow in 1963 and finally to the Free North, Inverness in 1975.

History has always been an interest, a hobby or rather a passion of Hugh Ferrier. After retiring he had more leisure than in the pastoral ministry and, having an active mind he has enjoyed studying and writing these sketches of Scottish Church History. The one quality that all will remember who have contact with Mr. Ferrier's ministry is his warmth, love for the Lord and love for His people. This comes through clearly in the book. Here is a volume to stir your heart and cause you to long for God to pour out His Spirit again in mighty power as in days of old.

The Mow Cop Revival 1807

by Dr David Allen

This book traces the origin of a movement, which some historians have declared to be the most remarkable revival in British Methodism since the days of John Wesley. It began on a Staffordshire mount, but spread with astonishing rapidity and phenomenal success at a rate said to surpass even that of Wesley's day. It was John Wesley who said of prayer meetings, "In many places they have been of more use than even the preaching. And in them the flame first broke out which afterwards spread through the whole people," and that certainly is the case with regard to the events on Mow Cop in May 1807. The centenary celebration took place on Monday 27th May 1907. On Monday morning, 27th May 1907, one London daily had a headline: "Sixty thousand Methodists on a Mountain." Another national daily estimated that anything from

50,000 to 100,000 people had been on Mow Cop over the weekend. It is right therefore, as we approach the bi-centenary, that we consider afresh that mighty movement of the Spirit of God.

God's Credentials: Belief and Unbelief on a Troubled World

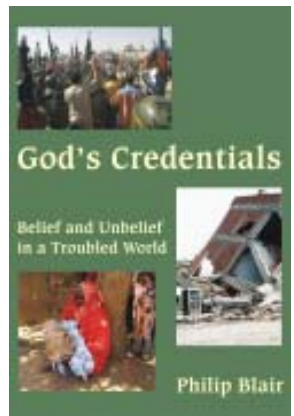
'I have never been more comfortable with the fact that I don't believe in God.'

This declaration of unbelief, uttered by a member of the British public on BBC Five Live a week after 'nine-eleven', epitomizes the response of many to the violence and bloodshed currently being perpetrated in the name of religion. It bespeaks the new urgency and intensity of today's popular debate about God.

In his scholarly and well-written study, Philip Blair traces and analyses man's attitude to the divine from earliest times to the present day, paying special attention to the witness of Jesus of Nazareth. After careful consideration of the data available, he concludes that belief in God is both normative and rational.

Dr Blair takes full account of atheistic contributions to the God-debate by thinkers and scientists such as Ludovic Kennedy, A.N. Wilson and, most recently, Richard Dawkins, exposing the weakness of their position with fact and cogent argument.

Philip Blair is currently Associate Professor of English at the University of Balamand, Lebanon. He is the author of two other works with religious themes, acclaimed respectively as 'this beacon of a book' (Daily Telegraph) and 'of vital contemporary relevance' (Christian Herald).

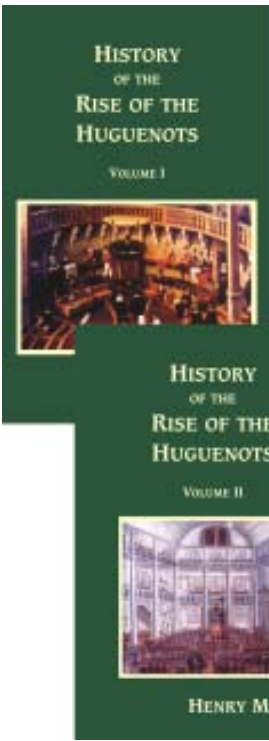

Henry Martyn Baird (1832-1906), American historian and educationalist, was a son of Robert Baird (1798-1863), a Presbyterian preacher and author who worked both in the United States and in Europe for the cause of temperance, was born in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on January 17 1832.

He spent eight years of his early youth with his father in Paris and Geneva, and in 1850 graduated at New York University. He then lived for two years in Italy and Greece, was a student in the Union Theological Seminary in New York City from 1853 to 1855, and in 1856 graduated at the Princeton Theological Seminary. He was a tutor for four years in the College of New Jersey (now Princeton University), and from 1859 until his death was professor of Greek language and literature in New York University.

He is best known, however, as a historian of the Huguenots. His work, which appeared in three parts, entitled respectively *History of the Rise of the Huguenots of France* (2 vols, 1879) - now reprinted, *The Huguenots and Henry of Navarre* (2 vols, 1886), and *The Huguenots and the Revocation of the Edict of Nantes* (2 vols, 1895), is described by the 1911 Encyclopedia Britannica as

being "characterized by painstaking thoroughness, by a judicial temper, and by scholarship of a high order".

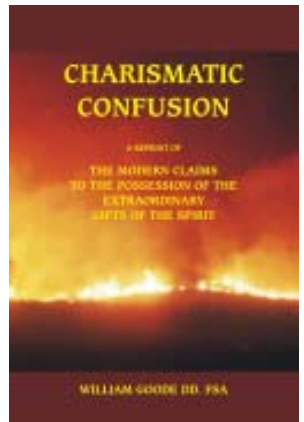
This third edition is a complete reprint of the Second Edition 1834.

- ◆ The Origins Of Charismatic Renewal
- ◆ The Admission Of A Counterfeit - Thoughts On The Origins Of The Charismatic Movement In Britain

In 1822 the Revd. Edward Irving (1792-1834) was appointed the Minister of the Scotch Church in London - Church of Scotland - and his preaching became the sensation of the Capital, being attended by 'statesmen, philosophers, poets, painters, and literary men; peers, merchants and fashionable ladies'. The reason was what we would now call a Charismatic movement imported from Scotland. Inevitably the Church was split, Irving was deposed for heresy and the 'Irvingites' formed a new denomination - the Catholic Apostolic Church which has only now become virtually extinct in Britain.

In this work Goode shows that, far from being new, these phenomena have been a recurring delusion down the Christian centuries. The relevance to the Pentecostal and Charismatic movements of the twentieth century will be obvious.



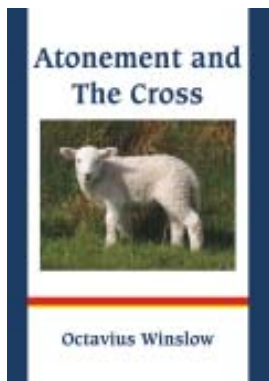
Book Review

This reprint of a 19th century response to the delusions of Edward Irving is a classic. The erudite author, a former Dean of Ripon, succeeds admirably in proving that modern claimants to charismatic gifts have nothing in common with those possessing extraordinary gifts of Scripture but everything in common with false claimants of the past. Bringing to bear on the issue a thoroughly Biblical perspective, an extensive grasp of church history and scholarship second to none, he systematically dismantles his opponents with the deftness of a surgeon. His most telling arguments are Irvingism's internal inconsistencies, the secrecy of its supposed revelations and their close resemblance to parallel manifestations in pagan religions. Inevitably he draws comparisons with Monasticism, a 2nd century charismatic movement which the Early Church Fathers condemned. Significantly, he attributes charismania to the proud, self-centered craving of our fallen nature for the marvellous; the presence in the church of false prophets, as predicted (Matt 7.22-23; 24.24; Rev 13.13-14); the power and deceptiveness of Satan;

and such natural phenomena as heightened mental and emotional states. He concludes that the post-apostolic disappearance of charismatic gifts is not attributable to unbelief (as Irving and modern charasmatics claim), but to their divine withdrawal on completion of the canon of Scripture. What is at stake is nothing less than the all-sufficiency of the Word of God written. As a standard reference work on the origins of modern charismaticism, Goode is indispensable. Need we add that it is cheap at the price? - Revd John M. Brentnall

Atonement and The Cross

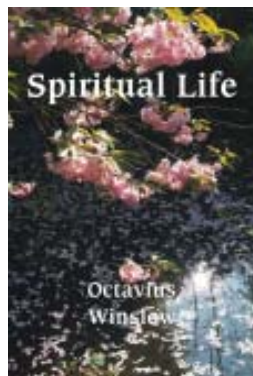
This is a republication of two books previously published separately as *The Atonement* and *The Foot of the Cross*. Octavius Winslow, who ministered during the 19th century in England, has seldom been equalled as a writer on the devotional aspects of Christianity. His works are marked by a profound grasp of theology combined with heart-searching application. In this he follows in the line of the Puritans and yet his style is more accessible to the modern reader. Winslow sums up his approach in the Preface to *The Atonement* when he states:

The religion of the Lord Jesus is valuable only as its power is experienced in the heart... The man of mere taste may applaud its external beauty—the philosopher may admire its ethics, the orator its eloquence, and the poet its sublimity, but if the Spirit of God take not his own truth, and impress it upon the heart, as to the great design of its revelation, it avails nothing.

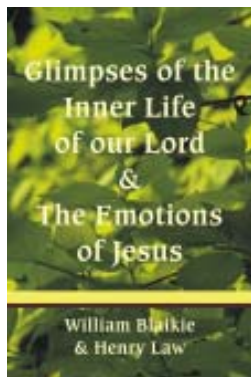

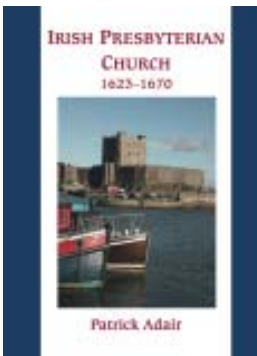
